The Monroe County Domestic Violence Coalition (MCDVC) is committed to improving our community's response to domestic violence issues through communication and coordination of services. Major projects of the Coalition include a semi-annual Domestic Violence Awareness Conference and the implementation and monitoring of an audit of our community's response to domestic violence.

Membership to the Domestic Violence Coalition is open to service providers, representatives from local communities of faith, and other organizations concerned with the elimination of domestic violence in our community.

These statistics are provided to (1) assist domestic violence survivors in decision making and (2) assist the organizations that serve these individuals by providing information about other domestic violence resources.

DISCLAIMER: This information is not a complete representation of domestic violence in Monroe County. It represents data collected by agencies under specific circumstances that report to the Monroe County Domestic Violence Coalition.

Domestic Violence in the Monroe County Legal System

This chart provides an abbreviated description of how a report is processed through the Monroe County legal system. While it is frequently more complex than what is shown here, it represents what happens in the Monroe County community (and this can vary greatly in other Indiana counties).



Investigating Agencies

There are multiple investigating agencies in Monroe County that first respond to a report of domestic violence, including the Bloomington Police Department, Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Ellettsville Police Department, Indiana University Police Department, and the Indiana State Police. Officers from these agencies investigate and then decide if they can establish probable cause that a crime has been committed.

Monroe County Prosecutor's Office

The Monroe County Prosecutor's Office reviews reports submitted by investigating agencies to determine if there is sufficient, credible, and admissible evidence to prove the charge beyond a reasonable doubt. Upon the determination that the Prosecutor's Office can meet the highest standard of reasonable doubt, the Prosecutor's Office will proceed to file charges against the alleged perpetrator. After charges are filed, the defendant will have an initial hearing, at which the defendant enters a plea of guilty or not guilty, is advised of their rights, is informed of the range of penalties, and may request a public defender. If the defendant enters a plea of not guilty,



the case will proceed to a pretrial conference—a meeting between the prosecutor, defendant, and defense attorney. Possible case resolutions are represented in the corresponding chart.

Community Supervision

The Department of Corrections oversees perpetrators in jail. The perpetrator can be released on parole or after their sentence has been fulfilled. If a perpetrator is sentenced to probation, they go directly to the Department of Probation following their sentencing hearing. The perpetrator will meet with an intake officer to collect general information and then meets with a violent offender officer who will personally oversee their case. The violent offender officer provides a plan that the perpetrator must complete before being released from probation. This plan may include mandatory counseling, anger management programs, rehabilitation programs for drug or alcohol use, budgeting exercises, and much more.

If the perpetrator ever violates probation, it is at the discretion of the violent offender officer to send the case back to trial. If the perpetrator fulfills their probation requirement, they are then released.

Incarceration

The terms "prison" and "jail" are often used interchangeably, but actually are very different. Jails are usually administered by local law enforcement, such as the County Sheriff's Department, or by local government. A jail is designed to confine people for short periods of time while they are serving a short sentence or awaiting trial. On the other hand, a prison is operated by the state government or the Federal Bureau of Prisons and is designed to house convicted criminals for much longer durations, including for life.





Only instances of Domestic Battery are counted in these numbers. An Exception Clearance means all leads have been exhausted. All numbers provided are subject to change as further information is gathered regarding each incident. All cases are marked following the FBI's Uniformed Crime Reporting Guidelines.



The Monroe County Prosecutor's Office represents the people of the State of Indiana to seek justice, promote greater public safety, and assist victims of crimes. They receive reports from law enforcement agencies and file criminal charges in appropriate cases. They prosecute those who are guilty, while ensuring that the innocent are not wrongly convicted or oppressed. The office works proactively with law enforcement and other organizations to encourage crime prevention and education efforts that enhance public safety and improve the quality of life in the community.



50 new cases were received between October-December 2016: 28 felonies 22 misdemeanors. The previous graph displays dispositions of Domestic Violence cases resolved from October 1, 2016 – December 31, 2016. A case is designated Domestic Violence based upon a current or former intimate partner relationship between the victim and the defendant.

Explanation of Categories:

Guilty Plea to DV Case

Defendant was convicted of a domestic violence charge pursuant to a negotiated plea agreement.

Guilty Plea to Companion Case

Defendant was convicted of an offense in a related case pursuant to a negotiated plea agreement.

Dismissed

The charge against the defendant is dismissed.

In situations where the evidence likely does not support an outright conviction the state may still seek to achieve a favorable outcome that provides a meaningful response to protect victim safety along with accountability for the defendant through supervision and rehabilitation services; including the following:

Deferred Prosecution

Case remains pending for a period of time while defendant completes certain conditions with the charge dismissed upon successful completion. **Domestic Violence Intervention System (DVIS)** Diversion program whereby the Defendant must successfully complete a Batterer's Treatment Program, consume no alcohol or illicit drugs, and commit no new criminal offense for one year to earn a dismissal of the charge. PROTECTIVE ORDER PROJECT at Indiana University Maurer School of Law

The Protective Order Project (POP) is a program directed by law students working under the direction of an attorney, designed to help victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking obtain civil protective orders from the court.

POP's goal is to prevent further abuse, both by restraining the abuser and empowering the victim.
